# **OCTOBER IN THE GARDEN**

Now that the soil is starting to warm up it is time to get sowing seeds and plants into those garden beds that have been manured up and cleared of weeds during the winter.

Top priority in my large garden are potatoes and onions as any oversupply can be stored for next year. Onion seedling start growing straight away this time of year and should include white varieties for salads and current eating, while red strains will last up to two or three months as will the long keeping winter varieties.

Carrots and parsnips can also be sown now; seeds of course, and I find it useful to lay a flat board or paling over the seed row immediately after sowing. The cover keeps the birds and cats away and saves on watering, but needs to come off as soon as the seedlings appear.

Other seeds that can be sown under glass include tomatoes, capsicums, zucchini, pumpkin, celery and lettuce. In early October the first sowing of French Beans can be made and all being well the first picking will be for Christmas; a lot easier than banking on the first tomatoes for 25<sup>th</sup> December.

At this time of year the rhubarb patch can do with a feed of animal manure or liquid fertilizer to stimulate those nice red stalks that we all aim for.

If the weather is dry all the plants need regular water so although it might be cool don't miss out on this vital requirement.

#### **Fabulous Fruit Cake**

2 Cups self raising flour 2 x 375g packets mixed dried fruit. 1 x 600ml carton iced coffee (or chocolate).

Place mixed fruit in a bowl and pour iced coffee over.

Mix together: leave overnight.

Next day: sift flour on to mixture and blend thoroughly.

Bake in a greased and lined 20 cm cake tin, 180C, 1 ½ hours approximately.

Allow to cool in tin, on a wire rack, before turning out.

This is not a "keeping" cake, other than by freezing, which is successful for up to six months. It will keep in a container in the refrigerator for about one month.
