#### MAY IN THE GARDEN

After all the wonderful Autumn colours of our deciduous trees it is now time to clean up and compost all those wonderful leaves. We have a glory vine and the red leaves have been a picture this year and now they are falling they make ideal compost material or mulch for the garden beds.

A good layer of mulch from the local council has been used to spread over some vacant garden beds to suppress Winter weed growth which can be used later to top up other areas and the cleared beds returned to production with Spring plantings.

While the soil is still warm there is still time to get some flower seedlings planted for a spring show. Poppies, pansies, primula, calendula, polyanthus & anemone can all be planted in a sunny situation.

Pruning is another job that can be started now and if cuttings of deciduous plants are required they can go into a damp spot with at least half of their length in the soil. Roses strike very easily if planted in early Winter and although the new plants take longer to establish than bought grafted bushes there is no problem with unwanted suckers from the home grown product. Don't be tempted to try to strike chrysanthemums from cuttings now; the safest way is to wait till Spring and plant cuttings from the fresh suckers. I will be planting a second patch of broad beans soon and also the seed of onions.

Don't forget to help the growing crop along with a little liquid manure as it is a good stimulant for Winter growth.
