Dandenong Ranges Botanic Garden (Formerly, The National Rhododendron Garden)



The Dandenong Ranges Botanic Garden is Victoria's premier coolclimate garden. The garden features important collections of Rhododendrons, Azaleas, Camellias and more, in a setting of native and exotic trees.

WORLD ROSE CONVENTION

Every three years the World Federation of Rose Societies holds the World Rose Convention which brings together rose enthusiasts and experts from around the world with garden visits and expert lectures. The last one was held in 2018 in Copehagen. In 2021 Adelaide was to hold the 19th World Rose Convention, however it was postponed due to the COVID 19 pandemic due to restrictions on both and international travel.

This event was finally held in the beautiful City of Adelaide from 27 October 2022 to 3 November 2022. This Convention also staged a large-scale public exhibition. There was an indoor rose exhibition incorporating Australian Rose Championships together with floral display.

A photo competition was held as part of the Adelaide International Rose and Garden Expo 2022 and the 2022 Word Rose Convention. Participants were able to submit their rose photographs under any of the five classes. Class 1: A photo of any rose. Class 2: A floral arrangement where roses predominate. Class 3: A photograph of any rose garden where dominate roses photograph. Class 4: A single stem displaying a bloom of a hybrid tea, grandiflora, miniature, miniflora or a single rose (eight or less petals). Class 5: A cut displaying a cluster of a floribunda, shrub or polyantha. The first three classes did not require the name of the rose and cultivar. however it was requirement for Class 4 and 5.

I participated in this photo competition and my photograph of "Jubilee Celebration" bred by David Austin which is a shrub rose received third place in Class 5. This is the first time I am participating in a photo competition and that too of this

calibre and I was pleased with the results. Jubilee Celebration is a large English shrub rose that produces large domed coral-pink blooms with hints of gold in its petals which glints in sunlight. It's a beautiful rose which was named in commemoration of the Queen's Golden Jubilee.

SAUSAGE ROLLS

Prep: 20 Minutes - Cook: 35 Minutes - Easy - Serves 16

Ingredients

- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 1 brown onion, finely chopped
- ½ cup firmly packed grated carrot
- 500g sausage mince
- 250g beef mince
- ½ cup panko (Japanese-style) breadcrumbs
- 1 Tbsp korma curry paste
- 2 Tbsp tomato sauce
- 1 tsp sea-salt flakes
- ½ tsp finely ground black pepper

- 4 sheets frozen puff pastry, partially thawed, halved lengthways
- Extra 2 Tbsp panko breadcrumbs
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 tsp sesame seeds
- Extra tomato sauce, to serve



Method

Line 2 oven trays with baking paper. Heat oil in a large frying pan over a medium heat. Add onion and carrot and cook, stirring occasionally, for 5 minutes or until onion is soft.

Using a wooden spoon, combine minces in a large bowl. Stir in breadcrumbs, curry paste, tomato sauce, salt, pepper, and onion and carrot mixture until combined.

Put pastry on a clean surface and scatter over extra breadcrumbs. Put ½ cup mince mixture in a large zip lock bag and snip 1 corner. Pipe mince mixture down 1 long edge of 1 pastry rectangle.

Brush opposite long edge with egg. Roll up firmly to enclose filling. Repeat with remaining mince mixture, pastry and egg, reserving a little egg. Put sausage rolls on prepared trays and freeze for 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 200°C. Brush sausage rolls with reserved egg, then scatter over sesame seeds. Cut each roll in half.

Bake sausage rolls for 25-30 minutes or until golden and cooked through. Set aside for 10 minutes. Serve with extra sauce on the side.
