EXHIBITING HINTS

When exhibiting Cut Flowers, is usually restricted to softwood annuals and perennials. Must not include material from hardwood trees, shrubs or creepers but may include Roses, Hydrangeas, Euphorbia wulfenii, Marguerites, Pelargoniums and Salvias.

Aquilegia: Strong stems with good branching habit. Flowers are large and well poised. Colours are clear. Free from blemish, spurs lengthy.

Chrysanthemum: Blooms that have good form, freshness and colour. Freedom from blemish or disease, good stems, uniformity.

Orchids: Spikes which are of good length and firm with evenly spaced open flowers that are facing upwards. Most blooms should be open and in proportion to the length of the stem.

Daffodil: Clean, fresh flower at right angles to the stem and looking at the judge. Stem straight, neck of flower short and sturdy.

Dahlia: Blooms fresh and clean with all florets intact, firm and without blemish. Circular shape with good depth and shown at the

right stage of maturity. Good stems, good colour and free from damage and disease.

Gladioli: An erect spike, with fresh, unblemished blooms and foliage. A long, well-balanced spike, still carrying the bottom flower and numerous other regularly spaced open and opening flowers and buds, so placed as to hide the stem and gradually narrowing from base to top. An ideal spike would be one third in full flower, one third with buds in colour and one third in green bud.

Poppy: Single flowers, perfect cup shape, up to 10cm with 4 petals, 2 inside and 2 outside, directly opposite. Should display bright yellow stamens and large pollen capsules. Long, straight, hairy stems.

Zinnia: Flowers which are refined and of good form, true to type. Clear, self-colours or blends, with no bleaching. Long, straight, stiff stems, with clean undamaged foliage.

PEANUT BUTTER BREAD



No-yeast peanut butter bread

Ingredients: 500 mL (2 cups) all purpose flour. 60 mL (¹/₄ cup) sugar. 20 mL (¹/₄ cup) baking powder. 2 mL (¹/₂ tsp) salt. 325 mL (1 1/3 cup) milk. 125 mL (¹/₂ cup) peanut butter.

Method:

Preheat oven to 160°C (325°F). Mix together the dry ingredients. Mix in the milk, and then the peanut butter. Scrape into a greased loaf tin and

bake for 1 hour.
