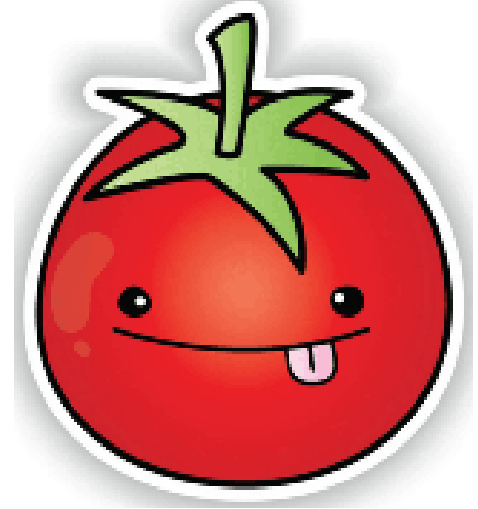
The committee also invites members to contribute photos and other club memorabilia as we look

TOMATOES



As summer approaches and the weather is slowly starting to warm up we start getting back into the garden. One vegetable that is easy for the home gardener to grow is the tomato. Most families would only need to grow a couple of plants to give them a fresh supply of fruit the season.

There are two ways to start growing Tomatoes, either by seed or buying young seedlings from your local nursery. The local nursery will have a small selection available. A far wider range of varieties is available from seed. Some people collect and save their own seed to use the following season. Make sure you collect from the strongest, healthiest and tastiest plants.



To have Tomatoes for Xmas you will need to sow the seed in early spring. Sow the seed into pots using a good seed raising mix. The mix should be open and drain well. Keep the pot in a warm position and in a couple of weeks pot seedlings into individual pots.

Don't over feed the young plants, as you should encourage them to flower and start producing fruit. A good location to plant is a sunny warm part in the garden that has good drainage.



A number of varieties are available as seed from various suppliers. Here are a few you may like to grow. Black Russian, Burnley Surecrop, Cindel, First Prize, Green Zebra, Jubilee, Moneymaker, Oxheart, Roma, Rouge de Marmande, Sweet Bite, Tiny Tim, Tommy Toe, Yellow Pear, KY1.

Generally speaking, it will take between 10-14 weeks for tomatoes to mature (11-13 weeks for cherry tomatoes). So as long as you have enough warmer days ahead of you for your tomatoes to mature, then it's okay to plant.

What is the best time to plant tomatoes according to the moon cycles?

The best times for planting tomatoes for the rest of this year are the fertile signs of the zodiac.

The following dates are ideal for planting tomatoes:

October: 2, 6, 7, 8, 26, 27.

November: 3, 4, 7, 26, 27, 30.

December: 4, 5, 6, 24, 27, 28.

DAHLIAS

Do not plant Dahlias until the danger of frosts has passed. The old saying was plant around "Cup Day". It is normal for tubers to grow shoots before they are planted. If shoots are damaged, cut them off and wait for the tuber to grow new shoots.

How To Grow:

1/ Choose a location in full sun or part sun with well draining soil.

2/ Dig over soil and enrich with compost or blood and bone.

3/ Space tubers 40cm apart.

4/ Dig a 10-15cm deep hole and plant the tuber horizontally with the "Eye" or shoot pointing upwards.

5/ Cover with soil and water in well. Do not water further until shoots emerge.

6/ Place a sturdy stake next to the tuber to support the plant as it grows.

7/ Protect shoots from slugs and snails.

ORANGE WORLD



On a recent road trip to Mildura I ventured over the border to visit 'Orange World' a working 50 acre citrus property offering tours around the picturesque orchard of avocado trees, numerous citrus varieties and tree grafting areas. We boarded the tractor train and headed into the trees.



Our first stop was to pick mandarin. Mandarins are picked with the stalk attached as pulling the fruit directly from the tree results in breaking the skin where the stalk is attached. Mandarins don't keep on the tree like other citrus do. They should be picked as soon as they turn orange.



The above photo shows a mandarin tree whose rootstock has taken over

the tree. Although it is covered in fruit, they are very sour and the tree has been marked to be removed.

The farm is owned by Maria and Mario. Maria makes preserves from the fruit to sell in their shop and they also sell wonderful blood orange sorbet and orange sorbet. I tried blood orange before the tour and the orange after the tour. Both were outstanding. If you are in the area I would recommend a visit.

1831 MARLBOROUGH PIE



The origin seems to be in England, with the first written recipe for this pie appearing around 1660.

Ingredients:

3 large eggs, beaten
175 mL stewed apples
175 mL sherry
175 mL sugar
175 mL butter, melted
60 mL 35% cream
5 mL (1 tsp) nutmeg
5 mL (1 tsp) cinnamon
Pie dough for a single crust 9" shallow pie dish

Method:

Preheat oven to 180°C (350°F)
In a bowl mix together all of the ingredients and place in a lined 9" pie dish. Bake for about 60 minutes or until the custard is just cooked.
