October - speaker Jaclyn Crupi


Thanks to Jaclyn for her inspiring and knowledgeable talk.

Garden Visit to Dianne McKenzie's Garden in Northcote

On Sunday 9th of November a few of us visited Dianne McKenzie's beautiful garden in Northcote. Here are some notes from Dianne

I was so happy to see you at our open garden day for Preston Garden Club members. Thank you for spending time with me and Trice and for your interest and comments about the garden.

We started making our garden 25 years ago. It is designed and made by the two of us and we are completely self-taught. Being self-taught is interesting - we made lots of mistakes, have lost a lot of plants and have some trees that we wouldn't choose to plant now. On the other hand we have a huge range of successful plants that many people have never seen in a small, suburban garden.

The best trees are the crepe myrtles and the fastigiate gingko. They do well, even through summer, and don't need a lot of water. The gingko in particular is a slow growing, lovely tall tree that goes butter yellow in autumn. In a small garden like ours, though, you do need a fastigiate (upright) form or else you'll have wide branches taking up too much room.

Our best perennials are the salvias - of course! Salvia 'Anthony Parker' is cut to half it's height in early December. That thickens it up so it doesn't fall over. It also makes it flower later in autumn just when you want something fresh for the honeyeaters. Salvia chiapensis and Salvia buchananii both have glossy dark green leaves and will flower even in part shade. Out the front, taking the western sun, are Salvia involucrata 'Bethelii' (Rosebud Sage) and Salvia leucantha 'Harry's Red' (Mexican Sage). You can get them from the Victorian Salvia Study Group online shop and 'Harry's Red' is from Lambley Nursery.

Wild strawberries as a ground cover have been really successful and the birds and skinks like the fruit. Euphorbia robbiae (Mrs. Robbs Bonnet) is going well, too, in a super dry spot under trees.

We have some bulbs which were sadly over by November. We grow some species tulips (T. clusiana 'Cynthia' and T. saxatilis), 'Campernelle' daffodils, a lovely tall blue squill (Scilla hyacinthoides) and an ixia with duck egg blue flowers.

Basically we have about 80% tough, easy plants and 20% that need a bit of extra care.

I love it that you saw the garden as it is now. It will be sad to see it gone to allow the builder to update our house.

Emmeline Bowman and her team from Stem Landscape Architecture and Design are going to help us create a new garden. She has a deep and wide knowledge of plants and how to support local birds and animals. Our brief is for the new garden to be 'calm, enclosing, green, and a nurturing place for people and animals'. When it is finished you must come over and see the new plants and all the changes she will make.

Recipe - Plain Cream Scones

I haven't baked for years so this is a recipe from a country cook book from the area where I grew up.

My mum made this scone recipe when we were expecting to have friends and relatives over to visit. She used to cook in a wood burner slow combustion stove.



- Pre-heat oven to 230C (for gas & electric stoves)
- Two(2) cups of Self Raising Flour.
- Quarter (1/4) teaspoon of salt.
- Sift dry ingredients together into a mixing bowl.
 Make a well in the centre of the dry mix.
- Pour in half (1/2) a cup of cream, and three quarters (3/4) a cup of milk.
 - Mix well with a knife.
- Turn the dough onto a floured board and knead gently.
 Gently pat or roll to half an inch (1.5cm) thick,
- Cut into squares, or shapes.
 Place on a greased tray, and glaze tops with milk
- Bake at 230C for 7-10 mins, until tops are golden brown.
 To test if cooked, the sides should be set.
- Lift on to a cake cooler.
- Cover with a clean tea towel if desired.

November Item of the Month - Three Flowers Shown Separately

- · Using 3 green tubes makes this exhibit.
- Usually 3 flowers of the same Kind is best, one colour or mix is ok.
- Arranged one behind the other, the middle flower taller than the front and back flower taller than the middle, like a step at each level.
- Flowers to be of good quality, no marks, damage etc

Meet Preston Garden clubber – Barbara Duggan

Tell us your gardening story: Growing up in the country, near the border of SA & VIC, our garden was a combination of veggie patch, fruit trees, a mix of roses, daisies, carnations, geraniums, and any other plant that would grow in the horrible sandy soil. I enjoyed helping mum with the gardening. She showed me how to propagate roses and geraniums from cuttings. When the plants grew, my interest in gardening increased. A few years after I moved to Melbourne, I met my future husband. We were living in West Preston when I bought my first plant from McEwan's in 1982. I still have that little fern,



and over the years, added an Umbrella plant, a Parlour Palm, a lemon tree, a nice collection of Azaleas, and had fun with Geranium & Pelargonium cuttings. I also bought a Tree Fern stump from McEwan's in 1986, where the salesman said that it won't last in a pot. It's still in the pot.



When I moved into my current rental address in Preston, I scored a few extra plants, and one was an Orchid. The neighbour and I, attempt to grow veggies in the front garden of my unit, where it gets the best sun. We share the results which have seen mixed successes. While dealing with some major physical health issues, the poor potted plants suffered while I couldn't spend time giving them the TLC they needed to thrive. The bonus Orchid stuck with me, and it finally flowered after 8 years, and for a couple of seasons. A new back fence went up, and the Orchid was put into a new location, which it didn't like. With the new back fence, I needed to be creative by making a shade cloth cover, without damage to the property, to protect my growing collection of Orchids and other plants that I had accumulated.

My next adventure is now going to be in Ballarat. My new unit has a long narrow back yard, with a raised garden bed on one side. A different creative garden project lies ahead.

How long have you been a member of the Preston Garden Club? Six years. Wayne Hurley told me about the Preston Garden Club activities when we were attending the Heidelberg Orchid Society Club meetings. I joined at the final Spring Show being held in the Darebin Town Hall in 2019. It was a good day to join the club,

because I won 1st prize in the raffle.

Any particular gardening interests? Having a go at growing veggies and watching plants grow into nice colourful plants. Love going to The International Gardening Show when I can, & love photographing plants and flowers at parklands, or open house' garden visits.

Favourite things about the Preston Garden Club? The members are nice, and it's good to share knowledge about gardening, or to touch base with other members, to find out how they are.



Favourite plant and why? Since getting my first Orchid, I guess Orchids are a favourite. Such a huge variety, and the blooms last for weeks. During 2013, I went to an Orchid show, where I was introduced to the wide variety of Orchids. In 2015, I found a local Orchid Society, which I joined, and since then the Orchid collection grew; from buying the odd plant, growing from back bulbs, to receiving Orchids as gifts, and an inheritance.

If space and cost were not an issue, what sort of garden would you choose? A garden with plenty of room for fruit trees and raised garden beds for planting a variety of vegetables. A couple of non-invasive trees to create shelter for the plants that thrive in a sheltered position,

and a nice oasis to sit under on nice days. Finally, a special shade house for the orchids, with the best temperature zones for the wide variety of Orchid needs.

Favourite season? Love the fresh colours of Spring and seeing the bees at work. Autumn provides a beautiful range of colours as the leaves are dropping.

What advice would you give to anyone looking to create their own garden? Look at your surrounds, and chat with neighbours who have nice gardens, to see if they can give you some tricks to help out along the way. Join a garden club, and enjoy the socialising, and learning about all types of gardening practices.
